McAtee strives to excel as scholar

At Great Bend High School, Darin McAtee, '88, achieved a 3.97 cumulative grade point average, placing him third in his graduating class. Since then, he has been striving to do even better.

"I lost out being first in my class by .03 of a point! I don't want that to happen again," said McAtee.

Brother McAtee was chosen as one of twenty sophomores to receive the prestigious University Scholar award. The award, based solely on academic achievement, was awarded to those in the sophomore class with a cumulative grade point average of 3.8 on a 4.0 scale, and future academic potential.

Each student works with a faculty adviser or mentor, who encourages intellectual development. The scholars are expected to take an individual or directed-study course with their mentors each semester.

McAtee's mentor is J. Michael Young, professor of philosophy

According to McAtee, the application process required three recommendations, two written essays, and a personal interview. The recipient is

awarded \$500 for both his junior and senior years.

For McAtee, this is one of many achievements. He has received the Lear award, given to the top freshmen grade point averages (he had a 4.0), a Summerfield Scholarship, which gives each winner \$500 a year for four years of academic study at KU, and he was the honor initiate of his pledge class.

For the future McAtee plans on majoring in communications and seeking a law degree.

"I'm really glad KU recognizes academic success to such an extent—it's going to make me work even harder to do well," McAtee said.

Brother Anderson is also active in his community; he serves as the Di-

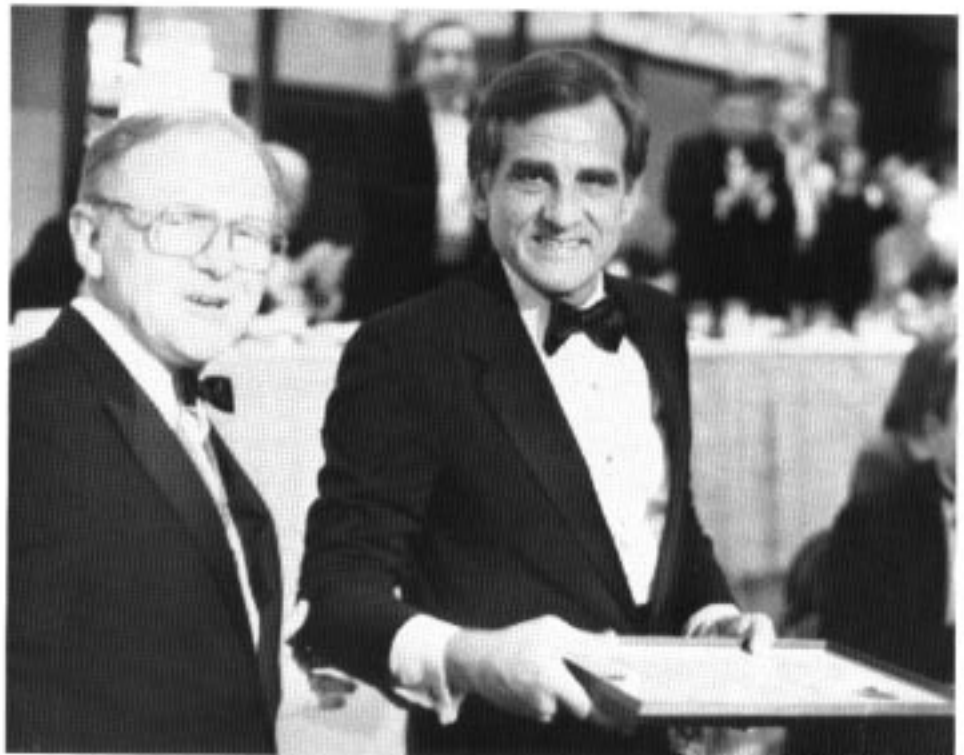
