













Balanced Man Scholarship Offers New Rush Opportunities

"Spirit healthy, body healthy." Kansas Gamma is looking for a few more good men who embody this sound philosophy. The new Balanced Man Scholarship program should assist Sig Ep in obtaining this recruiting

goal.

In its first year, the Balanced Man Scholarship is offered to male high school seniors who plan to attend the University of Kansas in the fall of 1993. The three scholarships are sponsored by the Kansas Gamma Alumni Association with the winner receiving his first semester tuition paid in full. The second place winner will be given \$100 for textbooks, while the third place winner will receive \$50 for textbooks. However, the award winners must first make it through the selection process.

High school students can start the selection process by filling out an application, which could be obtained from a counselor through March. The finalists are chosen based on a student's cumulative G.P.A., A.C.T. score, and activity participation. Next, the finalists are interviewed by

two members of the Balanced Man Committee to determine the award winners. Then the applicant is asked predetermined questions based on each application. But the Balanced Man Scholarship will benefit



the chapter indefinately because it will link the top high school students in Kansas to Kansas Gamma.

Sig Ep chapters around the nation have already realized the benefits that the Balanced Man Scholarship can have on a rush program, and a chapter as well. For example, the Sig Ep chapter at the University of Minnesota, Minnesota Alpha, has improved dramatically since using the program. Since 1987, manpower has increased from 10 members to over 60, while they have had the highest

grade point average on campus for over a year.

There have been other positive trends related to the implementation of the Balanced Man Scholarship. For example, a high percentage of

"It's going to give us a lot of names of men who have proven themselves not only in athletics and activities, but also in the classroom," said March.

Another advantage of the program is that it will make the chapter more diverse, since the applicants for the scholarship will come from all over the state of Kansas.

"Hopefully, we'll get the top balanced men in Kansas," said March.


"The college life in the U.S. is so much different from the life in Sweden, and I think I needed the support of a fraternity to study," said Goran.
